

Who Decides to List a Species as Endangered?



- The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service designates terrestrial and freshwater threatened or endangered species
- The National Marine Fisheries Service designates saltwater threatened or endangered species

Process to Add Species to Federal List See www.KeepingTexasFirst.org



Very Abbreviated Process Description

- Person or group submits petition to federal agency
- Agency has 90 days to determine if petition contains "substantial" information
- If agency decides that it does contain "substantial" information, the agency has 12 months to decide whether listing is warranted

Endangered Species in Texas



The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service currently lists 85 plants and animals found in Texas as endangered or threatened:

- •A threatened species is one likely to become endangered in the foreseeable future, within all or a significant part of its native range.
- •An endangered species is already becoming extinct throughout all or a significant part of its range.


Historic Number of Species Under Review

Taking the Lead

- 2009 Legislature: Interagency Task Force on Economic Growth and Endangered Species
 - CPA (presiding officer), TPWD, TSSWCB, TDA, TXDOT
 - Provide policy and technical assistance to local governments and communities

CPA Role in Endangered Species



Taking the Lead

- 2011 Legislature: SB 1 Support for Habitat Protect Measures
 - Authority to hold permits for conservation plans
 - Ensure confidentiality of information

Species of Concern Dunes Sagebrush Lizard




Dunes Sagebrush Lizard




- Proposed for listing in December 2010
- Potential impact to oil and gas and ranching
- Fish & Wildlife decision by June 2012, following a six-month extension granted in December 2011
- Little scientific information on this species in Texas
- Texas Conservation Plan


Dunes Sagebrush Lizard Range




Historic Range of Mussels of Concern

- Locally driven process
- Ensure confidentiality of information
- Voluntary programs
- Must use "best available science" need for more data

Why Science is Important Golden-Cheeked Warbler



Golden-Cheeked Warbler




- "Emergency listed' in 1990
- 1990 "Best available science" was that total range-wide male population was less than 20,000
- July 2000 biological opinion stated that Fort Hood had 70 percent of the known population

Golden-Cheeked Warbler



- Recent Texas A&M survey shows that range-wide population is greater than 220,000
- Less than five percent of this population is on Fort Hood property

Why Science is Important Johnston's Frankenia





Johnston's Frankenia



- The Fish & Wildlife Service listed
 Johnston's frankenia as endangered in
 1984 claiming that only 1,500 individual
 plants remained
- After the plant was listed, population surveys discovered that more than 4,000,000 individual plants existed
- FWS proposed delisting in 2011.
